## MEDICINES AT SCHOOL

**Any medication needed by students for ongoing medical conditions need to be supplied by you to the school, clearly labelled with the students name, tutor group and complete with relevant paperwork. Any pharmacy labels should be left in situ. This includes over the counter medications (Paracetamol/Ibuprofen etc.). Ratton school does not keep Paracetamol/Ibuprofen in stock to administer to students as this would constitute prescribing a medicine, something which we are not legally qualified to do.**
