GCSE REFORM UPDATE

As you may be aware GCSE qualifications are being reformed. Below is a summary explaining what we know about the changes. The new GCSEs (9-1 GCSEs) are being introduced gradually, with the first wave being taught from September 2015. Old style GCSEs (A* -G) GCSEs will no longer be taught from September 2018.

Reformed GCSEs (9-1 GCSEs)

Will be more demanding; have been designed for a two-year period of study; will be linear so students will take all of their exams at the end of the course (usually the end of year 11); non-exam assessment known as coursework or controlled assessment will be removed or reduced in the majority of GCSEs; will have a new grading scale from 9 to 1.

A New Grading Scale

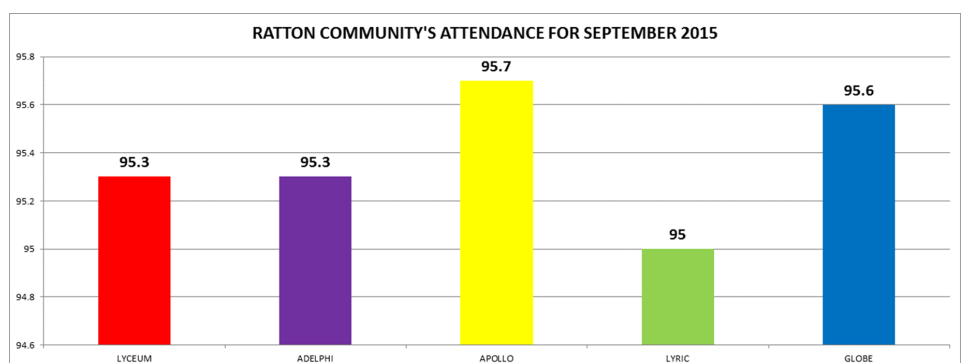
Reformed GCSEs will be introduced gradually over three years from September 2015. They will be graded from 9 to 1 instead of A* to G. Students taking GCSEs over this period will therefore receive a mixture of 9 to 1 and A* to G grades.

Students will not lose out as a result of the changes. Exam boards will ensure that: broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 4 and above as currently achieve a grade C and above; broadly the same proportion of students will achieve a grade 7 and above as currently achieve a grade A and above; the bottom of grade 1 will be aligned with the bottom of grade G; grade 5 will be awarded to around the top third of students gaining the equivalent of a grade C and bottom third of a grade B. A grade 5 has been defined as a good pass by the Department of Education.

The phased introduction of reformed GCSEs will mean students will receive a mixture of letter and number grades in summer 2017 and summer 2018.

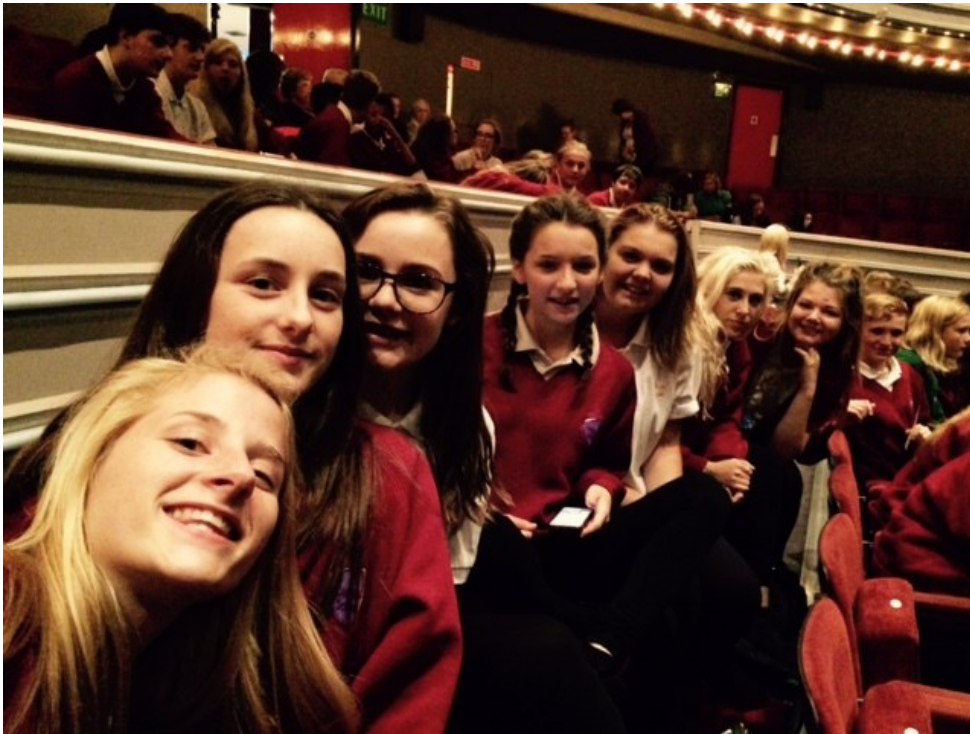
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An Inspector Calls—Review by Berry Eaglestone

Good Neighbour Schemes - volunteering opportunities for parents

East Sussex has one of the largest populations of people over the age of 85 in the country, with around 10 per cent of older people saying they feel lonely. The Good Neighbour Schemes are playing a vital role in tackling the growing problem of social isolation.

East Sussex County Council is working with five community and voluntary organisations to set up and develop Good Neighbour Schemes across East Sussex.

This exciting project is about:

helping others in your street, village or local area

popping in for a chat or helping out with practical things like shopping or gardening

getting involved with others in your community to lend a helping hand

using your skills to support your community

Good Neighbour Schemes link people who need some support with volunteers from their community who are able to help. The support includes befriending and can include practical help such as collecting shopping, pensions or prescriptions, small household jobs, helping with pets, letter writing and form filling.
